#### **Annex I - Technical Assessment**

Following the assessment of the final report, please find below some remarks and recommendations:

We congratulate HERMES partnership with a successful conclusion of your Erasmus Mundus Action 2 project and with having implemented a total number of 163 mobility flows. Although, the consortium's has had difficulties in respecting the required range of distribution for different types of mobility, the report provides justified reasons with regard to this incompliance and therefore the Agency has exceptionally accepted it.

It is worth mentioning that HERMES has been the first EM project coordinated by the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens and we would like to acknowledge all the good, responsible and professional work done by this coordinating institution to ensure the project's implementation. What is more, the key to the project's success was an excellent collaboration strategy chosen by the coordinator, namely, including all the partner HEIs in the decision-making process and evaluations procedures. This is considered as the best practice and has resulted in a very untied and supportive partnership, offering their help and solutions not only on a daily basis but also during critical times like the challenging situation with the capital control measures in Greece in 2015.

The project has generated many good practices, at individual, institution and regional levels.

The study **recognition** arrangements have been respected by all the partners. The ensured follow-up on the recognition process is acknowledged as good practice.

We would like to underline that the partnership's **quality assurance** measures were sound, coherent and aiming at transparency. The partner HEIs performed a very good follow-up on the scholarship holders being extremely attentive to the students' different needs.

Further, it should be noted that the requirements for cross-cutting issues linked to equal opportunities, gender balance and social equity were considered in the selection of candidates. Nevertheless, there were many more women grantees since, as stated in the report, the theme of the project is Humanities and these fields still gather more female applicants than male ones. The partnership also paid a particular attention to TG3 candidates; however, it was spotted that the partners were making confusion between the definitions of TG3 and that of the disadvantaged group.

Additionally, the prevention measures taken against **brain-drain** have proved very efficient and no issues have been reported in this respect.

Finally, we congratulate the HERMES partners with all the efforts made for the **sustainability** of your project. The consortium has managed to successfully foster the development of third-country partner HEIs, enhance the overall capacity to manage international mobility in the partner universities, build international partnership networks, and generate new cooperation initiatives among all partners.

### **Details regarding the ineligible costs:**

Taras ZABOLOTSKY's Post-doc mobility, 2nd Cohort, TG2 was 3-month mobility. Since 6-month duration is the minimum mobility period for this category, therefore the amount of 6.375 EUR (750 EUR under travel cost, 5.400 EUR under subsistence allowance and 225 EUR under insurance cost) is considered ineligible.

However, as the amount spent by the partnership exceeds the amount of the total grant received, the final balance remains 0 EUR.
